Rationale

Two milestones loom ahead: your first AP English exam and your entry into adulthood. Both require that you become an informed citizen, one who can discuss with relative ease the issues that face the world today. This assignment is designed to allow you to research an issue that you feel is significant. While researching the various aspects of your topic, you should be working toward drawing some conclusions about the impact that your issue will have on the world in which we live -- be it locally, nationally, or globally.

Writing Situation

Contemporary life is marked by controversy. Choose a controversial local, national, or global issue with which you are familiar or interested. Then, using appropriate evidence, write an essay that carefully considers the opposing positions on this controversy, takes a position on the issue, and proposes a solution or compromise.

Activities

- 1. Deconstruct the writing situation. Do you understand what you are being asked to do as a writer? Choose an issue and write a short paragraph explaining a) why this topic is of interest to you and b) why this topic is worthy of further study. THIS PARAGRAPH (should be typed) IS DUE TO GOOGLE CLASSROOM ON Monday, March 25.
- 2. Gather articles that explore your issue from several perspectives.
 - (a) Collect <u>at least 4 articles or editorials</u> and <u>at least 1 visual source (cartoon, chart, graph)</u> from reputable magazines (*Time*, *Newsweek*, *US News and World Report*) or newspapers (*New York Times, Washington Post, Atlanta Journal-Constitution* -- local/regional issues only).
 - (b) You may access articles from other sources, but verify with me that the source is reputable.
 - (c) You may use the internet to gather your information, but, again, you should only use articles posted on reputable sites.
 - (d) YOU MAY NOT USE WIKIPEDIA or procon.org (or similar generic sites) for this assignment.
 - (e) Another option to consider would be to watch a news program on television or to listen to one on the radio (particularly NPR -- 90.1 locally). If you choose that option, then you should a) record it so that you can view it or listen to it repeatedly and b) take accurate, copious notes.
 - (f) You might also take a look through the many **free** podcasts that are available for download.
 - (g) Your evidence must be current. Articles and etc. must be published within 1 year of the current day. (If you feel your topic is one where sources previous to this should be considered, check with me—I'm not opposed to it.)
- 3. Complete a note-taking sheet in your Google Drive (we are going to set this up in class on Monday) for each source. RESEARCH NOTES ARE DUE TO GOOGLE CLASSROOM Wednesday, April 10, by the end of the class period.
- 4. Decide on the thesis -- the central argument -- for your paper and prepare a good, <u>complete</u> rough draft. This rough draft should be in MLA format. **ROUGH DRAFTS ARE DUE TUESDAY, APRIL 23 to Turn It In. You need to bring either a printed hard copy OR be willing to share it on Google Drive with a classmate during peer review.**
- 5. Your final draft of your essay is due to Turn It in <u>by midnight on WEDNESDAY, APRIL 24</u>. You will need to turn in this draft to both Google Classroom AND Turn It In.
- 6. Last but not least your essay should include a works cited page with all the sources used in your essay. This works cited page should be included with your rough draft and your final draft.
