Means "thoughts on death"

William Cullen Bryant (1794-1878)

- One of the Fireside Poets
- Was raised as a conservative Puritan, but in his later teens/young 20s, he rejected those beliefs in favor of Deism (belief in a supreme being who does not interfere in the universe)
- Wrote "Thanatopsis" when he was just 17.
